Focus word: un perro - a dog (oon peh-rroh)





- I have a dog Tengo un perro His name is Kiko Se Ilama Kiko When Kiko is happy Cuando está feliz, He wags his tail like this Mueve la cola como así....
 - I have a dog Tengo un perro His name is Kiko Se Ilama Kiko When Kiko is curious Cuando está curioso. He moves his head to one side Mueve la cabeza a un lado,
 - I have a dog Tengo un perro His name is Kiko Se Ilama Kiko When Kiko wants to play Cuando quiere jugar, He barks just like this, Como así ladra

- I have a dog. Tengo un perro His name is Kiko Se llama Kiko When Kiko is scared Cuando tiene miedo, His ears prick up like this, Levanta las orejas como eso
- I have a dog. Tengo un perro His name is Kiko Se llama Kiko When Kiko feels warm Cuando tiene calor He sticks out his tongue like this, Saca la lengua como esto
 - have a dog, Tengo un perro, His name is kiko Se llama Kiko. He is my best friend Es mi mejor amigo I give him lots of kisses Le doy muchos besitos

Suggested actions and movement



Start every verse by pointing to yourself with both thumbs then use the corresponding sign for dog ~

BSL (British Sign Language): Point index and middle fingers downwards making small up and down movements.

LSE (Lengua de Signos Española): With one hand, open and close it while pulling away from the face in front of the nose to make a snout shape.

Then make the relevant actions for verses as follows:

- Make a happy face, then put one arm bent out behind you moving forwards and backwards to show a wagging tail.
- Make a curious face with thumb and forefinger on chin, then move head to one side.
- Make a play action as a running motion with both arms at sides, then bark just like Kiko!
- Make a scared face and action with hands, then use index fingers pointed up on either side of the head.
- Waft face with hands to show a hot action, then stick tongue out.
- Give yourself a hug then blow lots of kisses for Kiko!

Suggested adaptations

- Enjoy performing the actions to each verse
- to young babies and toddler encouraging
- them to copy you.

Collares para perros

This activity can be as creative as you like!

If you have a stuffed dog toy, then this would work really well, but if not, any stuffed animal would work too.

Using a strip of card cut to fit the stuffed toy's neck, let children decorate it however they like, then secure the collar with some sellotape.

They could add a tag and have a go at writing the first letter of their dog's name written over an outline.

If you'd like offer an extra challenge, give older children beads to string onto a collar instead to help develop their fine motor skills.
